






OPTION 1: Media Aware: Media Literacy Education Programs for Sexual and Relationship Health Promotion and Sexual Violence Prevention

PRESENTERS: Liz Reeder, Dr. Tracy M. Scull, Dr. Christina Dodson, & Jada Green

Description: Media are central in youth lives, yet media's impact on sexual and relationship health is often overlooked. From music to social media to pornography, media messages often communicate unhealthy, inaccurate, and incomplete messages about sex and relationships, which can lead youth to make risky sexual decisions and hold unhealthy beliefs about relationships. One evidence-based strategy to combat the potential adverse effects of media and promote health is to provide interventions grounded in media literacy education (MLE). MLE aims to enhance critical thinking about media messages related to health behaviors and give medically accurate health information frequently left out of media messages.

PRESENTERS: Lauren Radford & Megan Schroeder
DESCRIPTION: Are you interested in starting a teen advisory council at your organization? This session will cover success and challenges with examples from a teen advisory council with over ten years of success. Join us to learn more about the Gaston County Teen Action Council, our past successes, retention, structure, and planning.

> **OPTION 3:** The Foster-Friendly Healthcare Toolkit: A Guide to Delivering Quality Sexual and Reproductive Healthcare to Youth in Foster Care

PRESENTERS: Cindy Cruz & Jess Merino

DESCRIPTION: Healthcare providers are well-positioned to offer support, tools, and information to help foster youth benefit fully from health visits. "The Foster Friendly Healthcare Toolkit" was developed by a multidisciplinary team, including former and current foster youth and medical professionals, to explain what it takes to implement inclusive, respectful sexual and reproductive health care (SRH) that contributes to building a sense of agency for youth in care and with diverse identities. The Toolkit includes tools and a roadmap that allows users to evaluate and modify individual practice and the practice environment so that youth in foster care can access SRH. This presentation will introduce the Toolkit and how to navigate it. After attending this session, participants will be prepared to critically evaluate their own program and practice for its 'foster friendliness' using youth assessment tools.
